





Warmest greetings to all of you from your Alma Mater!



Last September 2018, Letty Lachica, my sister-in-law called from California. She told me about the AWESNA medical mission in Davao on February 2019. "You should come with us so we can go to your hometown after the medical mission," she said. "And also, the AWESNA officers are asking if your "adopted ministers" can help do the groundwork for the evangelism there."

And so, I went home with my sister-in-law and my brother. I checked on some of the adopted ministers in Mindanao, Cebu and Luzon and saw their situations. Just the traffic alone was enough to get me discouraged. I saw the sacrifices that they do every day for God's work. How can they provide for their families with such meager stipends? (Note: Because our funds are so low, the majority of them without sponsors receive only \$60 each month. Those with sponsors receive \$130 each month. Yet, they are so faithful in doing the Lord's work. And many more new theology graduates are applying each month.)

Praise God for the great harvest.

In the past 19 years of Adopt a Minister, I had received hundreds of baptism pictures from our adopted ministers, but that day (February 16, 2019) was my first time to witness a MASS Baptism with them involved. I was moved to tears. Precious souls started coming into the pool area until it got very crowded. In our last Endowment Fund Committee meeting on the eve of January 26, 2019 at Desert Hot Springs, the venue of our Annual Spiritual Retreat, the members present unanimously voted to get legal opinion regarding the possibility of totally or partially liquidating the existing Endowment Fund to AUP (sole beneficiary). The reasons were: 1) snail's pace progress reaching the targeted goal of \$1 million dollars due to lack of donation over eight AWESNA administrations, and 2) uncertainty of eventual fund disposition with new generation AWESNA leadership to come.

Legal consultation was contacted and on the time of this writing, we're still awaiting response. This time allotment gives us pause to perhaps reconsider our decision, and explore other options and possibilities: 1) AWESNA Endowment Fund as an ongoing major project,



ogy. Seminars and workshops on use of technology/social media will be provided. Of course, although I believe that members of all ages are capable of learning "new tricks", we need to respect individual preferences and provide alternative means for those who may not be comfortable with learning technology.

7. Focus on the following projects for this term:

- Continue fund raising for the Endowment Fund.

- At least one collaborative major project in cooperation with the AUP administration
- Improve the association's finances and increase membership through intensive promotions, including AWESNA Board members' and chapter officers' modeling of giving for the annual souvenir program ads/greetings, membership fees; and encouraging more involvement in the various chapters through meaningful, productive programs and activities.

On behalf of the incoming AWESNA officers, I solicit your prayers, support, and suggestions towards achieving the objectives set for the next term. With God at the helm of AWESNA, we will accomplish His purpose to "Shine On, forever for AUP" and above all, for His glory!

Funny thing is, when we were about to graduate, we wanted a class ring instead of a nursing pin – unbelievable, isn't it? – but that's how weird our class was, and can you imagine that one of us was so brave enough to speak up for our request to (DBS) Miss Salmin, the Dean of the School of Nursing. I remember her reply, “You all have gotten crazy”. We also requested to be accompanied by at least one of our instructors when we took the nursing board, just for emotional support, but her answer was, “We should not graduate you if you are that immature.” I don't know if that was some form of punishment, but probably she had a strong point.

Board exams came, and I am sure all of our instructors were very pessimistic about our passing rate. It was because they knew that we were not that serious in our studies. But can you believe that everybody got shocked and in awe, when the results were released because ALL of us passed the board exam. That happy-go-lucky class wasn't such after all. Previous classes always had some failures, 2 or 3, but I am so proud to say that Nursing Class '69 registered a 100% passing – we broke the record! Weird – yes, that's what I call it.

Another weird thing about our Nursing '69 class is the fact that we did not have any class reunion until our 40th anniversary. We finally had our first get together in May of 2009 in Las Vegas (of all places) and it was a very good turnout as there were 27 of us excluding our spouses and guests. When the introduction time came at the Fil-Am SDA church, each one of us went to the front as our names were called, and you could hear

were before when we were still at the Manila Sanitarium and Hospital where we were together for 3 years. Unusual – isn't it? Well, we have had our reunions every two years since then.

Each one of us got gainfully employed, some went to Canada, some are in the USA, and some to other places. Only two were left in the Philippines, but we all became successful in our careers. To sum it up, beloved PUC trained us very well, after all. ☺

These sixteen PRIMA LUX medicine graduates have been trained to become the uniquely AUPCOM-produced five-star plus physicians,



Their feet were the first to traverse the sidewalks and, yes, even the unpaved trails that connected the motor pool to the cafeteria, the dorms to the gym and PIC which were both still under construction at the time.

The work-study program yielded countless hours of valuable manpower which helped shape and construct the sprawling campus into what it is today. Where there are now concrete and asphalt roads were once dusty paths on sunny

days or muddy dirt roads on rainy days for these Pioneers to plod. There were not many vehicles on campus 40 years ago. The modes of transportation back then were just a few cars and mopeds whose engines would break the

stillness of the then quiet and tranquil rural atmosphere.

Fast forward 47 years – these '72 graduate nurses met on Valentine's weekend in Las Vegas, Nevada for a

reunion. Though marred by hardship and significant events coming into the world as new graduate nurses in 1972, they rose above these tragedies, prevailed and succeeded over the years. Welcomed by Fred & Laura Banaag, hosts of the 3-day reunion accommodations at Westgate Las Vegas Resort, the attendees settled into excited chatter even before the festivities commenced.

The weekend program was filled with planned and spontaneous activities that took attendees down memory lane – the shared experiences of the sleepless nights studying, long clinical hours, Sabbath activities, blooming relationships and the camaraderie bound this class with the unbreakable and special bond, a feat flawlessly executed and led by Asher Reyes. It was "a dose of bliss to our souls" and topping it up with the renewal of vows of two couple's wedding



anniversary celebration complete with wedding entourage. Other program participants included Abelardo Osorio (speaker), Dem Villar (prayer), Lala Andres Banaag, Ofelia Osorio (class tee cosponsor), and many others.

Dr. Ulysses Carbajal, MD

(August 10, 1922 – February 22, 2016)


Ulysses Carbajal was one of those AWESNA presidents that came into the position at the twilight of his life. A very accomplished physician who specialized in eyes, ear, nose and throat (EENT), he dedicated his life and work to others from the time he graduated AUP in 1947 until his last days when he physically could no longer serve. As much as AWESNA wants to honor a man for his short term as president, the man was larger and bigger than the sum of his AWESNA accomplishments. To focus only on this would certainly be myopic considering the breadth of his impact to AWESNA and beyond.

In the 1950s, Dr. Carbajal arrived in Los Angeles for his residency program. He quickly got introduced to a few Filipinos attending Los Angeles Central City SDA Church. Together, they worked hard to organize the first Filipino SDA group in Wilmington, CA (1957) – which, after several changes due to growth, aggressive

campaigning for funds, and negotiations with the city by Dr. Carbajal and colleagues, eventually culminated in the building of the Central Filipino SDA Church in 1992 on its' present location in Los Angeles.

In the 1960s, Dr. Carbajal saw a need for a health plan for the Philippines. His activities with the Philippine Medical Association (PMA) and local government officials eventually led to the establishment of PhilHealth Health Plan. More 50 years later in 2018, the insurance serves over 104 million Filipinos. On the same token, Dr. Carbajal also organized free medical missions throughout the Philippines over many decades, starting with the first medical mission in Legaspi City in the early 1960.

Fast forward to the 21st century, Dr. Carbajal became president of AWESNA soon after the turn of the century (2004-2005). He was in his ripe age at 80s. Upon review of his accomplishments on old BOO meeting minutes, Dr. Carbajal was instrumental in many of the projects we continue to support to this day: (1) launch and growth the endowment fund which is now at \$400,000; (2) sold out the 1st publication of Mirroflect under Ban Alsaybar & started publication of 2nd volume – today, Mirroflect is on its 5th volume; (3) spearheaded the planning and execution of the 2005 Joint Mega-convention EASNAC/AWESNA in Houston, Texas; (4) collaborated with AUP president in dissemination of funds; and lastly (5) in collaboration with San Diego Chapter,



Cris Anunciado (president) & members, offered the first formally funded CME event co-sponsored by Sharp Health-care called The Heart of Diabetes Care: New Approaches in the Management of an Ancient Disease. This event in Industry Hills, CA brought locally & nationally renowned endocrinologists/speakers such as Etie Moghissi MD, Daniel Einhorn MD and Eric Gold MD. This CME event was awarded \$13,000 for AWESNA from Novo Nordisk and Sanofi Pharmaceuticals.

Dr. Carbajal was truly the epitome of a life spent in service to others. His legacy is larger than his impact in AWESNA alone, and that was plenty enough. Dr. Carbajal improved and saved patients' lives as a physician but as an outstanding person in his own right, helped improve the lives of thousands of people with PhilHealth insurance, benefited from Philippine Medical Missions, and the hundreds of members that went through Central Filipino SDA Church. He is survived by his wife Jovita Carbajal, his children and grandchildren. ☺



- 13) AWESNA Endowment Fund—an ongoing annual contribution of 75% for AUP Faculty Upgrade and 25% Research fund from the annual interest yield for the past fifteen years (>\$55,000). Truly we are proud of our supportive AWESNA members!

An informed historical perspective on the Adventist University of the Philippines Alumni of Western North America's(AUP AWESNA) origins and development must be situated within the context of the great Filipino Diaspora, the dispersal of Filipinos over the face of the earth (esp. last 40 years of the 20th century), largely to North America. Values of Adventist spirituality and work ethic acquired from PUC/AUP, combined with old-fashioned Filipino cultural values, have served alumni abroad in good stead. Here is AWESNA'S historical timeline:


1950s: PUC Baesan medical doctors, nurses, and medical technologists come to America via the Exchange Visitor Program (EVP). Includes Celedonio Fernando and Eliseo Repique at White Memorial Hospital, Ulysses Carbajal at UCLA and others. Many Filipino professionals want to stay on but are constrained by immigration law to exit after expiration of their fellowships and re-apply for visas.

1960s: More alumni, mostly nurses, arrive, many work in Glendale Adventist Hospital (e.g. Angie Mendoza Cabellon, Jerida Alsaybar Magas, Ludy Malaguit Mendoza and others).

1965: Landmark Immigration Reform Bill clears US Congress, assigns 20,000 visas annually for Filipino immigrants under the family reunification principle. This triggers immigration fever, engendering virtual transplantation of the PUC Baesa community to American shores.

AWESNA'S STAGES OF DEVELOPMENT:

1969-1974: Embryonic Stage: Refers to the group's conception and gestation in the institutional womb of the pioneering Central Filipino Church. It began as the "Pacific Union Chapter" of the Philippine Union College Alumni Association. It had no Constitution and Bylaws. Its purpose was to get PUCians together, to fellowship in a religious setting. Elected first president, Dr. George Atiga provides spiritual guidance during CFC church retreats. He exhorts alumni to help finish God's work in both the Philippines and North America.

AWESNA at 50: True and Faithful, on a Different Shore

1974-1989: Formalization, Stabilization, and Crisis Intervention Stage: At some undetermined point, Pacific Union Chapter became “Western USA Chapter” (WUSAC). Dr. Celedonio Fernando a neurosurgeon and spell-binding orator, becomes president and moving spirit, professionalizes the association, and begins lengthy era (15 years) of stabilization, supportive intervention for PUC, and organizational growth. His first act was to draft a Constitution and Bylaws, draw a roster of membership and collect dues.

1976: Called the “SOS” or (“Save Our Silang”) campaign, Dr. Alfonso P. Roda travels across North America to appeal for funds. The \$30,000 raised signals the beginning of active North American alumni support for the fledgling Silang campus.

1980: The Link founded, first issue comes out, Alfea Salvador is first Editor-in-Chief. The newsletter helps bind the community together by providing information on current developments in PUC. (We might consider it as

precursor to today's digitally-driven Cyberlink). Also providing writing stimuli to the literary-minded. Original subchapters organized, from Fresno in the north to San Diego in the south. Tradition of annual honor classes started (a Nestor Zamora brainchild).

1984: Beginning of AIIAS/PUC Graduate School Crisis; higher, colonial-driven authorities try to gain control of coveted program. Dr. Alfonso P. Roda fights to prevent hostile take over, faculty, students, and alumni in the USA rally behind him. It is to be emphasized that without a viable graduate school, one of the Philippine government's requirements for upgrading to university status, PUC would not be called "AUP" today.

1986: Alumni Center Project (in the Silang campus) launched; ground-breaking ceremony in December 1986.

1987: On March 5 President Roda dies of a broken heart; interim president Dr. Esmeraldo de Leon continues fight to prevent AIIAS takeover of Graduate
